

Instead of thinking about what you are going to give from the desk of or get from people this Christmas, maybe we should

be thinking how we can grow in our walk with the Lord this Christmas. Christmas is about the birth of Christ, not about all the extra tuff which can be good, but can distract us from the real PRESENT, our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. The real tragedy for many of us is that we get wrapped up in the wrapping paper and miss the Lord.

God is love and this is all a love story about God's love for us. "In this the love of God was made manifest among us, that God sent his only Son into the world, so that we might live through him. In this is love, not that we loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be expiation for our sins" (1 Jn 4:9-10). This is the greatest present that we could ever receive; every other gift will fade over time. St. Augustine wrote "It is easy to want things from the Lord and vet not want the Lord Himself, as though the Gift could ever be preferable to the Giver." Ultimately only the Lord will satisfy our hearts as St. Augustine also wrote: "You have created us for yourself, and our heart is restless until it rests in you."

God loves us so much that he became one of us and died on the Cross for each of us. Just spend a little time thinking about that. Think about how much YOU ARE LOVED. This demands a response from us. Where have we failed in loving God and others in our actions and words, in what we have done and failed to do? Each of us should go to the Sacrament of Penance before Christmas. We need the healing and the grace from Jesus, Jesus Christ instituted the sacrament for our healing and forgiveness. "He breathed on them, and said to them, 'Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven, if you retain the sin of any they are retained" (Jn 20:22-23). The Catechism states "Through such an admission man looks squarely at his sins he is guilty of, takes responsibility for them, and thereby opens himself again to God and to the communion of the Church in order to make a new future possible (CCC 1455). We all need God's forgiveness and God's grace to be the person that we were meant to be.

The Catechism again states, "The whole power of the sacrament of Penance consists in restoring us to God's grace and joining us with him in an intimate friendship" (CCC 1468).

#### JOYFUL HOMES AREN'T PERFECT

## They assume the best.



Your brother posts something divisive on social media. A guy cuts you off in traffic. Your kid is whining. You can't control anything about these frustrations, except the most important thing: how you respond. When we assume the best, especially of those in our own home, we invite so much joy into families—even if we're wrong!

As a family, discuss:

- When is a time recently when someone annoyed or hurt you? What did you tell yourself their motive was?
- How can we see the situation from their point of view?
- What difference would it make if we assumed the best of each other and others all the time?

### Pich one practice this month!

One small, attainable goal sets us up for success.

- Imagine and speak out loud the good motives of those who frustrate you: He must be in a hurry. She really believes that is the best for me. It must be really difficult to make that kind of decision... I'm sure they took all the information into account.
- Ask a family member to tell you the reason behind a behavior that makes you crazy (see box at right).
- Pray each day for a specific person about whom you have difficulty assuming the best. Ask God for compassion to see through their eyes.
- Consider ways you have assigned bad motives to others, and bring them to the sacrament of Reconciliation.

#### FIND THE VALUE





Do you love someone who does things the wrong way? Maybe he folds the towels instead of rolling them, or she loads the dishwasher in a haphazard way.

These little behaviors can drive us crazy!

To get past this, simply ask the person the reason they approach the situation like that. Usually, the value behind their behavior is not so hard to support. Once we understand each other better, it's easier to come to a good solution.


Tom & Megan Mahoney along with Dan & Joan Dold are beginning a Marriage & Family Ministry at Sacred Heart.

In the past year, I have been getting to know more about Saint John Paul II. Although he was the pope during

most of my life, I was, sadly, quite unfamiliar with his life and with the issues he held dear. One of these issues was the importance of marriage and the family. I was surprised to learn that as a young priest in the 1940s, John Paul II conducted marriage preparation classes with engaged couples in his parish. I thought marriage preparation was one of the changes that came with Vatican II! As a parish priest, John Paul II built a community of young -initially single but later married persons, and he ministered to this community of families weekly. The community, which he called his Srodowisko, shared faith, values, and activities. John Paul II lived through Nazi-occupied Poland, Communist-occupied Poland, and constant persecution for his faith, and through all of it, he believed that the cornerstone of society - the foundation that would get the people of Christ through these trials, was marriage grounded in Christ, A strong marriage makes for a strong family, and a strong family makes for a community that can withstand all kinds of trials. The members of the Srodowisko were committed Catholic citizens that performed important functions at all levels of Polish society, even after John Paul II left parish ministry to serve as a bishop and then pope. Pope John Paul II's ministry spoke to me, and I felt called to start a Marriage and Family ministry here at Sacred Heart.

Marriage is vital, especially in the trials that we are now facing. Your sacrament is precious, not only to you and your spouse, but to our community. The Mahoneys and Dolds hope to build a Marriage & Family ministry here at Sacred Heart that will recognize and support marriages and families through shared faith, values and activities. We will be starting small due to the pandemic, but it too will pass eventually and then, hopefully, we will be able to expand. First, we will pray monthly for the married couples here at Sacred Heart in a Mass petition. We would also like to recognize anniversaries each month in the bulletin. Iff you would allow us to thank you for your witness through marriage, contact the church office or complete the Google Survey in the weekly this-n-that eNewsletter with your name and anniversary date.

Lastly, we are starting a marriage enrichment group that will meet monthly on Zoom. We are going to start by reading and discussing 21 Undeniable Secrets of Marriage by Dr. Allen Hunt in January. Please contact Megan Mahoney at meganohayes@gmail.com to sign up. Possible ideas for future activities include parenting groups, mentoring, an Anniversary Supper, and more. 
