









First Trimester

After fertilization and implantation, a baby is at first just an embryo: two layers of cells from which all the organs and body parts will develop. Growing quickly, your baby is soon about the size of a kidney bean and constantly moving. The heart is beating quickly and the intestines are forming. Your budding son or daughter's earlobes, eyelids, mouth, and nose are also taking shape.

Q: What Happens if someone drops a Consecrated Host?




A: Despite our best efforts, and this is as true in our liturgical celebrations as in all of life, accidents happen. Occasionally at Mass, a host may be dropped or some of the Precious Blood could even be spilled from the chalice, despite the best efforts of the priests, deacons, and extraordinary ministers of holy Communion assisting at the liturgy.

So, when a host is dropped or the Precious Blood is spilled, we can take guidance from the U.S. Bishops' statement Norms for the Distribution for Holy Communion Under Both Kinds:

All ministers of Holy Communion should show the greatest reverence for the Most Holy Eucharist by their demeanor, their attire, and the manner in which they handle the consecrated bread or wine. Should there be any mishap — as when, for example, the consecrated wine is spilled from the chalice — then the affected "area . . . should be washed with water, and this water should be then poured into the sacarium."

According to no. 280 of the General Instruction of the Roman Missal, the general rule is that a dropped host is picked up by the minister distributing Communion and reverently consumed. The minister should be careful to make sure that no other particles from the host remain on the ground. As we see in the instruction from the bishops, the Precious Blood would be absorbed (customarily with a purificator) and the area attentively and reverently washed with water which would then be disposed of properly. ©LPI



Whenever we interact with our priests, do we see them as human and frail like the rest of humanity? Or on the other hand, do we see them as

supermen, able to withstand all the stresses and strains of being human?

Our priests are very human. Quite possibly, even more human than most of us. Why? Because they not only have their own struggles being human, but they accompany us in our humanness too.

Therefore, this Priesthood Sunday, turn the tables. Attempt to be the listener to the human side of your priest. Do not automatically tell him your troubles; begin by asking him what is going on in his life. Thank him warmly for giving up so much to spend his life in service to others. Try it. You might be surprised to find out your priest is just like you! ©LPI

I have the personal phone number of four different priests in my contacts list - five if you count when Fr. Emmanuel visits the United States. I don't say this to boast but I say it with a chuckle. Never did I imagine I would even have one personal phone number of a priest. On more than one occasion when my turn has come to write this bulletin article, I have written about working for the church, specifically, working so closely to a priest. I see the sacrifices of the parish priest. It has made me appreciate the priestly vocation even more.

Today we celebrate Priesthood Sunday. Last year on Priesthood Sunday, I did something that I had never done before. I wrote a thank you letter to Fr. Earl Meyer, the priest who baptized me. I wrote a thank you letter to Fr. Bill Surmeier, the priest that Confirmed my husband into the Catholic Church and married us. I wrote a thank you letter to Fr. Farrar in appreciation for his spiritual guidance. I also had my son write thank you notes to Fr. Daryl Olmstead, the priest that baptized him, and to Fr. Farrar, the priest that gave him his first Eucharist and allowed him to be a weekday Mass altar server at the age of 6. We wrote these letters to say thank you for their dedication to their vocation, to thank them for their gift of self to their parish, to the Church, to me and my family.

Have you ever taken time to thank a priest? I was inspired to do this because of one of my favorite prayers for priests: O Jesus, I pray for your Priests, for faithful and fervent Priests, for your unfaithful and tepid Priests, for your Priests laboring at home or abroad in distant mission fields, for your tempted Priests, for your lonely and desolate Priests, for your young Priests, for your dying Priests, for the Souls of the Priests in Purgatory. But above all, I recommend the Priests dearest to me: The Holy Father; the Priest who baptized me; the Priests who absolved me from my sins; the Priests whose Masses I've attended and who gave me Your Body and Blood in Holy Communion; the Priest who taught and instructed me; all the Priests who I am indebted to in any way. Oh Jesus, keep them close to Your heart and Bless them abundantly in time and in Eternity. Amen.

Priests are people, too. I am reminded of this when I see the Fathers who live on our campus in their street clothes or as they stroll back to the rectory after a gym workout. I saw it when Fr. Nick had his tent staked in the front yard of the rectory. I saw it when Fr. Farrar sat at my dining room table to help Xavier put together a puzzle. I saw it in Fr. Farrar's competitiveness as we played a board game.

When we only encounter our parish priest in the sacraments, it's easy to think of them as "holier than us" and there is certainly truth to that!! However, there are priests who lose faith, are tempted by the evil one, and who doubt their vocation. Our priests need us just as much as we need them. On this Priesthood Sunday, I challenge you to write a thank you letter to a priest who has impacted your life or has given you the sacraments. I guarantee it'll make their day. Who knows? You might even get a letter in reply...like we did!

We ask for ears that will hear the cries of children unborn and those abandoned, Men and women oppressed because of race or creed, religion or gender. 




