As we prepare to celebrate "Presidents' Day" holiday, it is important to remember the deep faith of our founding fathers. On October 3, 1789, George Washington gave a Presidential Proclamation to acknowledge God and offer "thanksgiving" to him. The proclamation stated, in part, "...it is the duty of all Nations to acknowledge the providence of Almighty God, to obey his will, to be grateful for his benefits, and humbly to implore his protection and favor" — and "to recommend to the People of the United States a day of public thanksgiving and prayer to be observed by acknowledging with grateful hearts the many signal favors of

Almighty God..."

And, we are all familiar with the greatness of Abraham Lincoln, whose purpose was to free the slaves and heal a nation. In his second inaugural address on March 4, 1865, he stated, "With malice toward none, with charity for all, with firmness in the right as God gives us to see the right, let us strive on to finish the work we are in, to bind up the nation's wounds, to care for him who shall have borne the battle and for his widow and his orphan...".

Lent is the time leading up to the commemoration of our Lord's death for our sins and the commemoration of his resurrection for our salvation. At the very center of our calendar is the three great days we celebrate during Holy

Week called the Triduum: Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Resurrection of the Lord. Lent is a preparation time for this. Jesus is always our example; prior to undertaking his ministry, Jesus spent forty days in the wilderness praying and fasting. Through the wisdom of Christ's bride, the Church, we are called to imitate Christ with a forty-day period of prayer, fasting and almsgiving to prepare for the climax of Christ ministry on Good Friday and Easter Sunday.

Jesus calls us to be in the world but not of the world, however being in the world, at times we become distracted. Lent is a time to refocus on Christ and his call for each of us to practice our faith in both our actions and our words. Let's face it, we are in a culture that is no longer Christian, we must intentionally choose Christ every day. Christ's grace is always available to us, but we can't be asleep at the wheel. We must practice what St. John Paul II called self-mastery. If we cannot say no to anything, then our yes does not really mean anything. By denying ourselves something we enjoy, we discipline our wills so that we are not slaves to our wants. By training ourselves to resist temptations when they are not sinful, we train ourselves to reject temptations when they are sinful. Ultimately the question is: are we fans of Christ, watching from the sidelines or are we disciples of Christ walking in his footsteps? Christ calls us to be walking in his footsteps.


The Church calls us to the practices of fasting, almsgiving and prayer during Lent. Let us fast from something that we like: TV, the internet, sports on TV, YouTube, etc. We all know where we like to spend our time. Use that time to read the gospels one hour a night. You will never regret spending your time reading the words of Jesus Christ who loves you and who died on the Cross for you. Almsgiving is a sacrificial gift on top of what we already give. Challenge yourselves on almsgiving and pray about it. Finally, prayer, we need prayer every day. I urge everyone to read the gospel reading everyday during Lent and ask the Lord to open our hearts and minds to something in that gospel for that day.




Track the progress of your Spiritual Adoption!

Second Trimester

Q: Is it ever okay to leave Mass before it ends?

A: This is an interesting question because beneath the surface there seems to be an assumption that if it's okay, then why do we have to stay after we receive communion? The short answer is "no," but we definitely want to go a bit deeper as we consider why.


First, when we think about questions like this, we must consider this in adult terms. If there is something gravely important that we need to do, then we must attend to that. However, if it is a matter of convenience or preference, then we really have to stop and think again. First, while we always want to recognize the importance of sacramental communion in the Mass, we also need to understand how important the time of thanksgiving and prayer after communion is. This is summarized in the Prayer After Communion offered by the celebrant and then we are also commissioned to "Go forth" during the Dismissal of the Mass, reminding us that we have been entrusted with a gift — the Word of God and the Presence of Christ in the sacrament — and that we are to share that gift with others.

If we simply leave after we receive communion, we risk two things. First, there is the possibility that we will turn our reception of communion into a purely personal, individual experience that is separated from our common experience of worship — and communion in the fullest sense — and, second, we lose an opportunity for gratitude and serious reflection if we simply leave after communion. This time of thanksgiving, reflection, and, ultimately, missioning, are important and, in the end, an essential part of the celebration of the Mass. ©LPi


Stations of the Cross with Exposition & Benediction each Friday during Lent beginning February 19 at 6 p.m.



CRS Rice Bowl is the Lenten program of Catholic Relief Services, the official relief and development agency of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops. Through CRS Rice Bowl, faith communities in dioceses throughout the United States put their faith into action through prayer, fasting and almsgiving. Lenten alms donated through CRS Rice Bowl support the work of CRS in more than 100 different countries each year. Twenty-five percent of donations to CRS Rice Bowl stay in the local diocese, supporting hunger and poverty alleviation efforts. Since its inception in 1975, CRS Rice Bowl has raised nearly \$300 million.

CRS Rice Bowl is a simple cardboard box and is a tool for collecting Lenten alms — and comes with a Lenten calendar that guides families through the 40 days of Lent with activities, reflections and stories.

The Holy See has issued directive on the distribution of blessed ashes during the pandemic. The Priest and other ministers will distribute ashes to the faithful by *sprinkling* the ashes on the head of each individual in lieu of tracing a cross on the forehead.

The office for Liturgy and Sacramental Life at the Archdiocese of KCK would like to remind the faithful that the practice of sprinkling ashes upon the crown of the head is one of the customary manners in which the Ash Wednesday rite is observed throughout the world and should not be considered less than the customary practice of tracing a cross with the ashes on the forehead.

An Ash Wednesday Prayer: "Ashes to ashes. Dust to dust." You remind us today, oh Lord, of our origin and end. In the beginning, You fashioned us in the Garden. You dignified dust with the Breath of Life. You made us in Your image and likeness. You led Your people through the dust of the Sinai wilderness to the Promised Land. You overcame temptation in the dry desert. You healed the blind with dirt and clay. Three times Your body stirred the dust as you fell on the road to Calvary. Hear the cry of Your people! One day we will return to dust. This Lenten season, stir our minds to contemplate You, our hearts to love You, and our bodies to serve You in our brothers and sisters. May our prayer, fasting, and almsgiving be Your breath alive in us. Amen.


